## **BW-12 Update**

The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2014 (Omnibus) was signed by President Obama in January. The Omnibus prohibits the NFIP from implementing Section 207 of .the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act of 2012.

Section 207 directed FEMA to ensure that certain property's flood insurance rates reflect its full risk after a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) change or update is released. However, Section 207 does not relate to changes to insurance rates that have already taken place. The Omnibus does not roll back any rate increases that have already occurred.

Although FEMA is required to cease any current planning and development activities for Section 207, it is not prohibited from continuing mapping activities or from exercising existing authorities to set insurance rates.

Additionally, changes to the NFIP such as phasing out subsidies for certain policyholders remain in effect as mandated by Section 205 of the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act of 2012.

As mandated in the Omnibus, Section 207 will not be implemented for twelve to eighteen months after the start of Fiscal Year 2015.

## NOAA's Community Planning Course

The Coastal Community Planning and Development training from National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Coastal Services Center helps participants grapple with development and redevelopment issues in ways that can maximize community benefits and limit negative consequences. After a recent redesign of the course, participants can receive the full benefit of this popular training in half the time.

The redesigned training incorporates online in-person components. The online portion can be done on the participant's own time (one to two hours) and offers easy step-by-step guidance. The inperson workshop component now takes just one day instead of two. The workshop features group exercises, a local speaker and community discussions. information about tools that can support alternative development approaches.

Course trainees get the biggest benefit when a wide variety of community members attend. Participants often include local elected officials and related coastal personnel, resource managers, business leaders. developers and realtors, land use and hazard mitigation planners, floodplain and emergency managers, and concerned community residents and groups.

Determining how and where growth and redevelopment occurs can have huge environmental, economic, and social consequences. This training engages participants in learning about planning processes. conventional patterns of development, impacts, and alternative development options. It also offers techniques for engaging stakeholders in a variety of settings.
